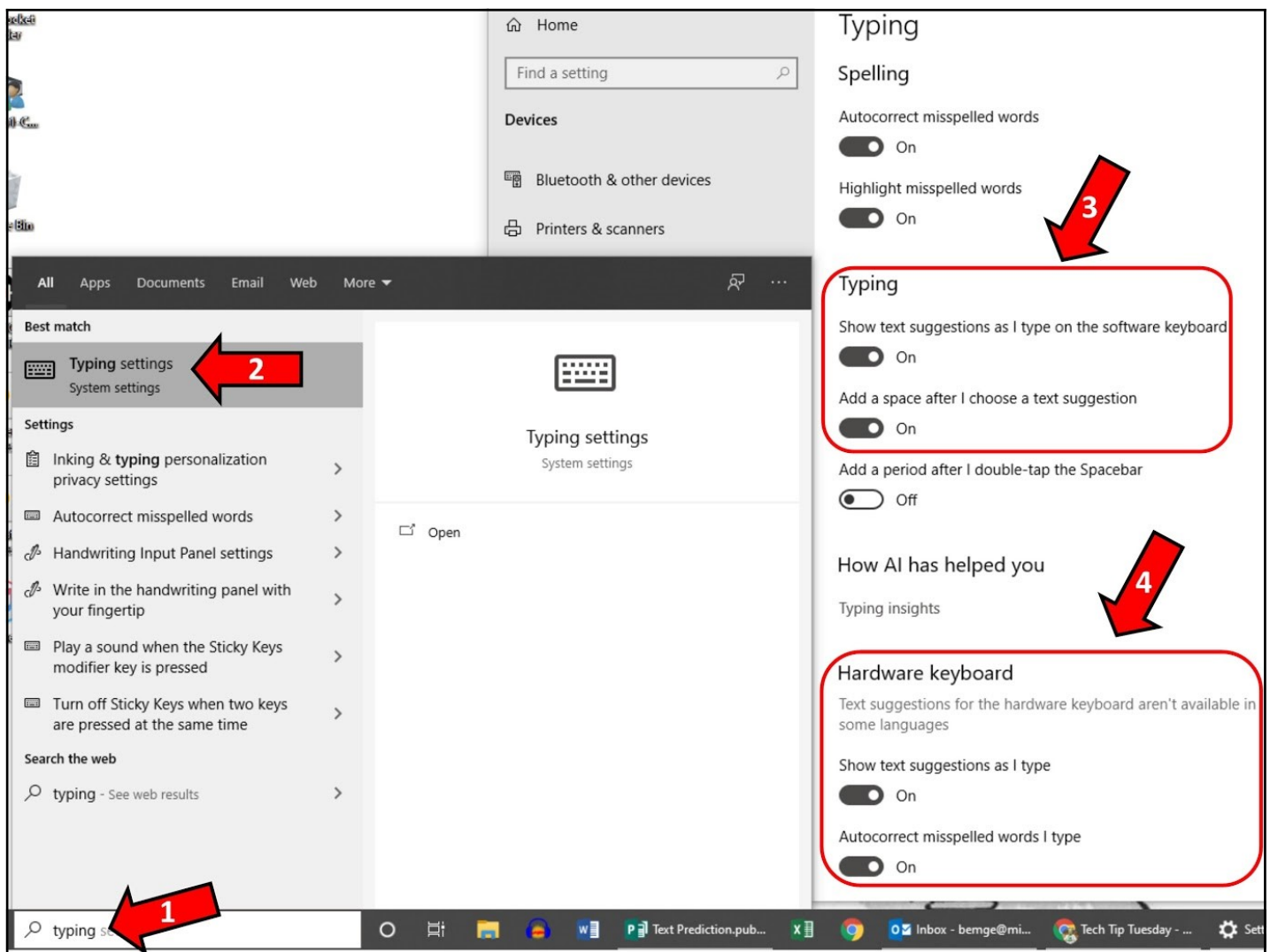
Text Prediction

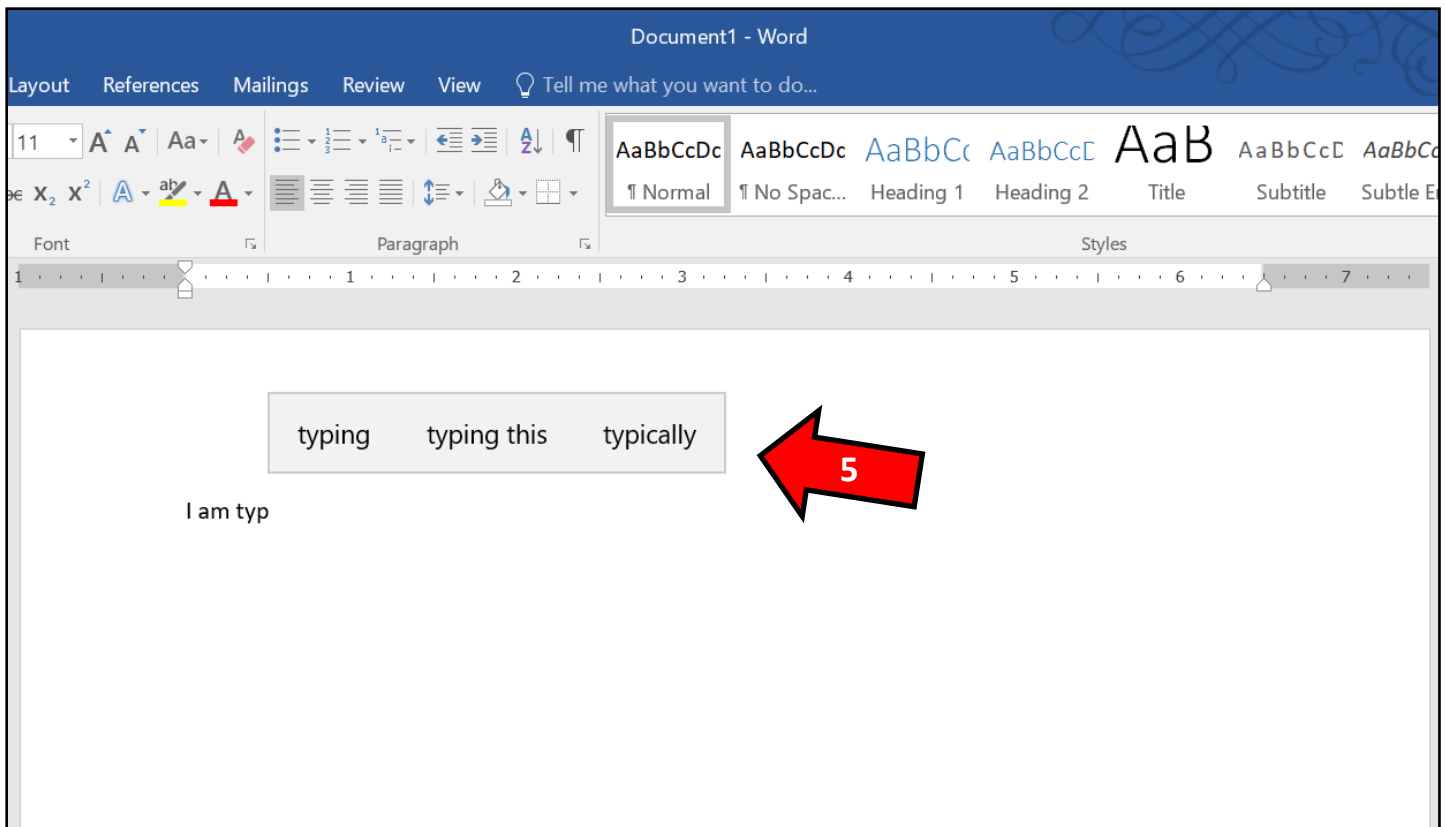
Your computer can predict what you're typing in a couple different ways. Learn how below!

On Windows 10 laptops:

1. Type "typing" in the Windows search box.
2. Choose "Typing Settings."
3. Under the Typing section, turn on "show text suggestions" and "add a space."
4. Under the Hardware section, turn on "show text suggestions."
5. When you type in places like Word, you'll see the prediction bar pop up.

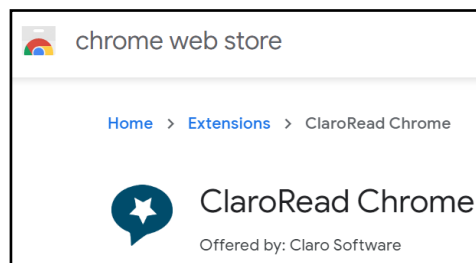
**Works in Word, Outlook, Google searches, etc. Doesn't work in Google Docs.*



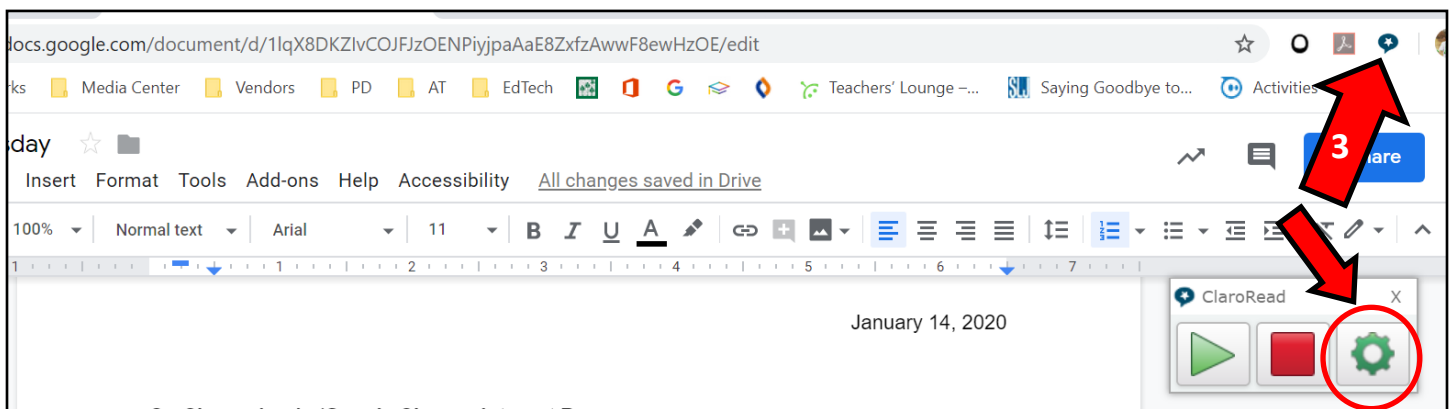


On Chromebooks/Google Chrome Internet Browser:

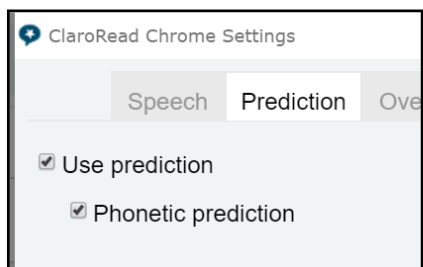
1. Chromebooks/Chrome Browsers do not have built in text prediction options. ClaroRead is the best free text prediction extension for all things Google.

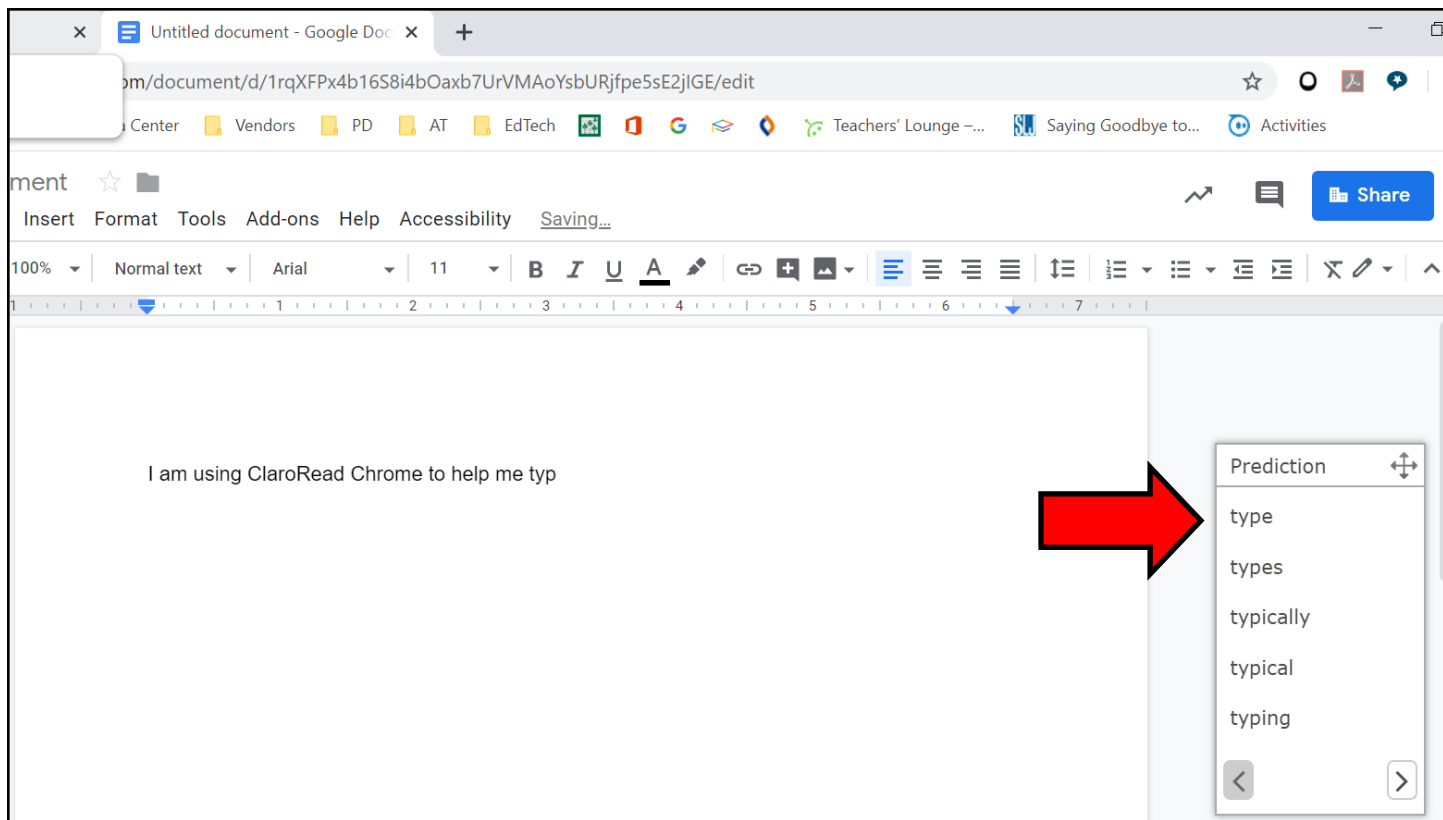
3. Once you add the extension, you should see the ClaroRead toolbar. Click the settings icon:



4. Choose the “Prediction” tab and check “Use prediction” AND “Phonetic prediction.”



*Prediction will start automatically. If you don't see the toolbar or prediction bar, try to close and reopen Chrome. You can also click the ClaroRead extension icon to bring the toolbar back.



ClaroRead can also be used to read things on the web aloud! You can adjust the “Speech” settings to have it read when you hover over words, click words, etc. Microsoft David, Microsoft Zira, and Google US English are the best voices.
