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WLP 2020: A European Journey Back to World War II

The Europe Trip was a Winter Learning experience for those who want to see the sights of Europe and who are fascinated with World War II; a deadly conflict that resulted in 70-85 million people dead yet has many historians intrigued for its battles, its army, navy, and air force vehicles of the Axis and Allies, and the many lessons that came out of it. The teachers and students that went on the trip are Elke Silva, Gage Clark, Mat Campbell, Henry Wallace, Michael Mendoza, Josiah Altland, Jack Holt, Avery Terpstra, Camille Michael, Maddie Taylor, Griffin Middleton, Mellik Johnson, Liam Couch, Zack Peppers, and Grace Gersack.

The basis of the trip was to learn about what happened in places like London or Munich during and before the War like how the Nazis came to power in Germany and what happened to London during the Blitz; a bombing raid on London by the Luftwaffe that lasted from 1940 to 1941. The journey went to London, Paris, Normandy, Cologne, Munich, and Dachau and it lasted from January 3 to January 12. The whole reason of the trip, as it was mentioned earlier, was to learn of the most important events in WWII and how they changed and impacted our history.

Some of our most impactful moments according to History teacher Mrs. Elke wee the structures at Normandy beaches and the concentration camp of Dachau. The Germans built these structures; bomb bunkers, batteries, coastal guns, and other defense weapons as part of the Atlantic Wall, a coastal defensive and fortification system designed to keep the Allies out of Europe if an invasion were to occur. The Atlantic Wall began in 1942 when Hitler ordered that the fortifications along the Western Coast of Europe would be constructed. Soon almost a million French workers were drafted to build it, when the wall was completed; it was frequently mentioned in Nazi propaganda bragging about the size and strength of it, although they could've just been exaggerating about it. On June 6, 1944, however, the Atlantic Wall was penetrated when the Allies stormed the beaches of Normandy and eventually running the Germans out of the bunkers of the Wall.

"I really enjoyed the trip, it expanded my knowledge of Europe, WWII, and the Holocaust, and just seeing the sights in real life gives me a understand of World War II history and not just from the textbook." Mat Campbell The concentration camp of Dachau is a sight that will make you sad, cry, angry, or a combination of negative emotions. Dachau was the first concentration camp to be opened in 1933, shortly after the Nazis took power in Germany. It was suppose to a prison labor camp that held political prisoners, but eventually it also included foreigners from countries Germany had conquered, Jews, Homosexuals, Slavs, Roma people or Gypsies, People with disabilities, Jehovah's Witnesses, Roman Catholics, Protestants, and those who disagreed with the Nazis and Hitler. Many of these people were treated with brutality, forced to work in horrible conditions, and were stripped of their personality traits, i.e. shaving their heads bald. 9

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However by 1944 and 1945, as other camps from Poland and in the Low Countries were liberated by the Allies, there was huge increase of prisoners transferred from said other camps to Dachau, but these prisoners burned at the crematoriums so that there would be no witnesses as to what happened, but another problem arose with the Nazis; what if the Allies could see the smoke? So they decided to just leave the dead bodies to just rot on the ground and/or on the rail wagons by the camp station. Eventually, the Americans found the camp and were met with horror, disgust, and anger; so much so that disobeyed orders and brought the citizens of Dachau to the sight of this camp. Ever since the 1960s, it has been turned into a memorial to remember the people that died in the conditions of the first concentration camp.

Overall, many students say the trip was a lot of fun, they enjoyed the food and culture, and the sights that captured them. Personally, I wish to back to Europe again, just so I can explore more what lies within every corner of the continent.



policy called Brexit, which is the UK governmental policy in which the UK would leave the European Union, a multi-European alliance established in 1993. In early 2016, former British Prime Minister David Cameron announced that there would be a Brexit vote. He, along with many others, believed that no one would vote to support Brexit policy, but they were all wrong. Leading up to election, no one really knew what leaving the EU would mean and none of the voters knew what the process of leaving the European Union would entail. But then Brexit, known as Article 50 in the United Kingdom, was set in motion, unsupported by David Cameron.

Even though he came up with it, Cameron decided to step down as PM. In June 2017, the UK General Election took place and Theresa May took PM leadership and the Conservative Party Members of Parliament (or MPs) took over the Parliament. Unfortunately, May was ineffective at being PM from day one. She did not even support Brexit and that she made little covering up that she hated her job. As Prime Minister for a little over two years, she was attempting the Sisyphean task to get the European Union and the British PM's to agree with her. In summer 2019, she announced that she was resigning from the PM position because she couldn't handle the job anymore. They had an election and here comes Boris Johnson. When Boris Johnson laid out his plan in parliament, he got yelled at by angry MPs. After that, a lot of MPs from Boris Johnson's Conservative





Bolivia has transformed from a role model country to a place of despair. The South American country has been hit with news of corruption and indigenous prosecution over the course of a few months. Before the headlines that signaled a dark age, Bolivia had stable governments and foreign relations. Furthermore, Bolivia was one of the South American countries to have an indigenous president in power during the start of the century. Bolivia was the last country to have a progressive leader. However, towards the end of 2019, Bolivia's former president Evo Morales left office. The reasons and consequences for leaving office would shake Bolivia to its core and change the course of Bolivia's history.

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Bolivia's descent into disarray started when former president Evo Morales ran for a fourth term, despite a constitutional limit to three terms. Morales won the election; however, protests began with reports of fraudulent votes. Morales stepped down from presidential power after the military and police began supporting the protests. Days afterwards, the Mexican government allowed Morales sanctuary in Mexico City. Unfortunately, Morales did not leave behind a presidential successor. A power vacuum formed in the Bolivian government, and protests continued throughout the country.

It was not long before a self-proclaimed leader rose to power. Jeanine Añez, Bo- Courtesy of NBC News livian Senate vice president, skipped the constitutional steps necessary to become a legitimate interim president. In addition to the illegitimate presidency, Añez had heavy Catholic imagery during the presidential ceremony, despite Bolivia being a secular state according to the Bolivian constitution. Añez is the political and religious opposite of Morales, and she is far from negotiating with the former president's government allies and policies. Thus, the first weeks of her power had signs of a dark age: opposing political party mem- Jeanine Añez



bers being witch-hunted, prosecution of Cubans and other minorities, Bolivia cutting off relations with former allies, violent protests ending with citizen deaths, and foreign governments condemning the political state of Bolivia.

The months of political turmoil caused Bolivia to spiral into a state of disrepair. The protests are against Añez's party for their police killing protestors that were supporting Morales. Furthermore, Añez or her party members have made no reference to the protestor's deaths and instead calls for Israel's assistance against the protests, labeling them as acts of terrorism. In addition to the governmental corruption, Bolivia is suffering from a reported food and fuel shortage. The lessfortunate of Bolivia are hit the hardest, as the country has among the

highest poverty rates in South America. The greatest hope for Bolivia is the re-election which has been announced to take place on May 3. However, fears of more election interference arose when the United States Agency for International Development, an independent agency responsible for foreign aid, arrived in Bolivia in January. Bolivia is now at another turning point, and the future of the once-stable country depends on the remaining faith of Bolivia's citizens and politicians.

The Ongoing Neglect With Voting Machines


Colored pencils are more regulated than today's voting machines. The Brennan Center for Justice, based in the New York University School of Law, released a report stating that voting machine companies have little federal oversight. Furthermore, these private companies have no legal or financial pressure to update their products. For years, voting machines have been outdated and vulnerable to digital interference, according to the report. Despite the passage of time, little support from the companies and the government has been allocated to voting machines.

Speaking of the government side of things, Congress was reported to not prioritize voting machine security, similar to the companies. **Lawrence Norden**, co-author of the report, says "This is another security vulnerability that Congress hasn't addressed," which means that there

is something preventing Congress from acting on this issue. The roadblock to fixing voting machines is not any laws that must be changed or removed, rather it is the lack of laws that protect voting machines. Chances are, the politicians that were voted into Congress most likely used the same voting machine system to get them into office than the voting machines of now. This creates the problem of politicians owing their victories to dated voting machines, and no incentive to pass laws helping voting machines.

What does all of this mean in the upcoming 2020 Presidential Election? Congress would treat the election as any other election in terms of voting machine regulation because Congress has ignored voting machine regulation for years. In addition, the 2020 Election is too soon for any effective laws to be passed. The past has not been as hopeful as the present. Congress has not given any funds or staff to the appropriate voting agencies, such as the United States Election Assistance Commission, in recent years. Congress has underfunded state money toward voting machines as well. This is a critical problem because states are responsible for allocating funds for voting machines.





The easy proof of this lack of regulation lies with media coverage. A simple search of voting machine regulation offers an active string of articles that are consistent with the Brennan Center's report. Public attention is present in the issue of voting machines, yet there is little public action. While there is wide coverage on the vulnerability of voting machines, there is little coverage on voting machine interference in elections. Thus, the public has been left in the dark about how to legally and effectively prevent another vote interference. Ε
