MSA SHUNS MASKS AT SPORTING EVENTS, CONTINUES TO REQUIRE THEM IN SCHOOL

DIFFERENCES IN MASK POLICIES DURING SCHOOL HOURS AND EXTRACURRICULAR SPORTS MAY BE SETTING A DANGEROUS STANDARD FOR COMMUNITY.

Mill Springs Academy has stringent set of policies in place regarding COVID-19 safety, including mandatory masks. temperature checks. contact tracing, and circles of contact. Why do these policies not translate to the school's extracurricular sports?

Despite attempts to keep in-person classes as safe as possible. including mask breaks, enforced social distancing, and temperature checks, efforts to keep school sports COVID-safe seem to have stalled. Per CDC.gov guidelines, "Vigorous exercise in a confined space (e.g., indoors) may contribute to transmission of COVID-19 and should be limited. Indoor activities pose more risk than outdoor activities. Minimize the amount of time spent indoors. If it is necessary to be inside, ensure the facility has proper ventilation and filtration systems and open windows and doors to increase airflow throughout the space."

Senior **Maclean Tadlock,** a Varsity Basketball player, shared that he "was not surprised that masks were not forced during practices and if you are playing in the game."

When asked what he thought the reasoning behind lax mask regulations were, he elaborated that "the only reason that I can say that might be the reason is that it is very hard (for me, at least) to breathe and run with a mask on."

Senior Jody Cleveland, a track/ cross country athlete, was also not surprised about mask requirements during sporting events and said, "It makes sense given the situation that we're all stuck in, but it's very hard to implement in a competitive sports environment where you basically required to breathe heavily. For the way it's worked since I've been running semester, it's mostly required for everyone to wear a mask until the moment the actual running starts."

Cleveland acknowledges the difference between strict in- school mask-wearing versus practices and games, responding, "I also recognize that it probably defeats the purpose of wearing them at school at that point. A chain is only as strong as its weakest link, so it doesn't make sense that we beef up security in some areas and ignore them in others, no matter how much sense it might make at the time."

Neither he nor **Tadlock** speaks to the high likelihood that continuing to run sporting events this way puts all those connected to the MSA community at risk.

Tadlock does share that "as athletes, we understand that there is a risk, and that you are essentially waiving your rights when you sign up. Plus, if someone wanted to avoid the risk by wearing a mask, the referees are not keeping them from doing so, as long as it is worn correctly." The problem is that though the students directly participating in these sports may have agreed to take the risk, the community as a whole has to be considered.

COVID- 19 continues to infect people each day, and as hospital beds and ventilators are filled up and the death toll in the country continues to rise, behaviors like these set a dangerous precedent. No one wants to lose out on activities that they enjoy, yet barriers should be in place to protect both those who wish to participate and those who chose to sit on the sidelines.

To keep members of the Mill Springs community safe, considerations should be taken to reevaluate how sports at school are conducted.

While it may be irksome to further change how this school year is run, everyone on and off the court should feel safe going to school.

Fans could really help with air circulation, decreasing the chances of catching COVID-19.

The Necessity of Circulation

AC units really help, but how?

AC units take in the air via outside fans and then filters it. After it has been filtered and cooled it is released into the room that the AC unit is in, forcing out the old air.

It continues this process over and over again and really helps. However, nothing beats just opening the window for a little.

Fans are widely used all around the world for cooling and circulating air, and they may have an even better use during this pandemic. When asked about using fans in the classroom, senior Matthew Kuhn stated, "I think that fans would be a pretty good addition to the classroom. The question is how many. I think two per classroom could work." Maybe while we use them during the pandemic, we could more closely interact with other students, unlikely, but maybe. This would be a great way to get back to school without as much worry for getting sick, it's not 100 percent guaranteed to work, but it is worth a try.

There are many types of fans, some less practical than others. Some varieties are ceiling fans, uprights, paper fans, etc. Uprights and AC units are more practical than paper fans or ceiling fans due to the air filtration system in AC units and the single side facing usage of uprights. Both of these also use electricity, which has to be more efficient than a paper fan.

The purposes of fans, moving and circulating air, coupled with open windows, could help to lower the risk of contracting COVID-19 in closed spaces, but student **Sarah Palmer** argues, "I guess I would only use one or the other. I don't see too many reasons to need to use both fans and open windows." Using fans on their own has actually been proven to increase the chances of particles spreading from person to person. Many teachers keep their windows open so that fresh, "uninfected" air can circulate in and out.

5 DEAD, COUNTLESS INJURED IN VIOLENT ATTACK OF US CAPITOL

DESPITE VARIOUS ACTS OF VIOLENCE COMMITTED ON THE GROUNDS OF THE US CAPITOL THE PAST TWO CENTURIES, THIS HAS BEEN THE FIRST BREACHING OF THE BUILDING SINCE 1814.

The flames of anger and bigotry have been fueled during President Donald Trump's four years in office, culminating in a violent riot where the US Capitol building was stormed in an effort to overturn the results of the 2020 election. But make no mistake, these violent aggressions committed during Trump's presidency are neither new nor the direct fault of his actions; this is America.

On January 6th 2021, members of Congress were meeting to confirm Joe Biden's victory from Presidential election results. Armed with pipe bombs, handguns, assault rifles, and the materials to build eleven Molotov cocktails with homemade napalm, per Independent News Outlet, rioters had overwhelmed temporary fencing constructed by police by the time Vice President Pence had begun speaking with Congress ("Capitol Riot").

Mill Spring's Junior, **Kat Hellerstein**, was assertive in her belief that this storming of the capitol was an act of domestic terrorism saying, "When people think of terrorism, it's always a foreign country, but it can happen most anywhere... it doesn't happen here because it's America [emphasis added], but it really did happen. A crowd of people ruled by one singular person who gave them the okay to do that. And they were breaking laws... And people were killed."

Senior English Teacher, **Shilpee Kathuria's** initial reaction to news of the Capitol Insurrection was one of "instant fear." She recounted that, "My first thought was that people were going to die and even though I am diametrically opposed to what the rioters believe, I didn't want anybody to die." Five people died in the attack. One police officer perished while physically engaging with rioters, one female rioter was shot, and three other rioters died from subsequent medical emergencies during the breaching of the Capitol.



As soon as they hit the fence line, the fight was on. Violent confrontations from the start. They came with riot helmets, gas masks, shields, pepper spray, fireworks, climbing gear — climbing gear!— explosives, metal pipes, baseball bats. I have never seen anything like it in 30 years of events in Washington."— Capitol Police Chief Steven Sund Source: WashingtonPost

On the day of the attack, countless flags were flown as the hordes of insurgents marched beneath them. While not all were explicitly violent in nature, a majority carried racially charged flags and other insignia with a long past of traceable, hateful rhetoric. Flags and symbols flown that day included the American flag, the Nazi flag, the Confederate flag, "Proud Boy" merchandise, and QAnon gear (paying tribute to an anti-Semetic, anti- LGBT-related conspiracy theorist).

Hellerstein, an AP Psychology student, pulls from her studies in an attempt to analyze how this tumultuous situation quickly became a self-righteous, violent attack on this country's democratic processes.

Hellerstein draws focus to a phenomenon she calls, "The Crowding Effect." To give a quick overview, she illustrates that people are more likely to act out and be bolder when surrounded by those with similar beliefs. HOW ALABAMA WAS ABLE TO OVERCOME 2020 TO WIN THE COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

Meet Devonta Smith: the Alabama wide receiver who, prior to the 2020 College Football season, was only known for his game-winning famous touchdown catch in the National Championship Game on Monday, January 8, 2018. Born in the small town of Amite City, Louisiana, Smith went to Amite High Magnet School. Though **Devonta** didn't have the size and strength. he made up for it with his killer speed and quickness. It is said that his teammates at 'Bama call him the "Slim Reaper," due to his skinniness and because he takes souls while on the field. Though Smith has declared for the NFL Draft, the wide receiver claims that he will be the hardest worker regardless of who picks him in the draft (nfl.com).



n Monday, January 11, 2021, the University of Alabama Crimson Tide won their third College Football Playoff National Championship, their 13th National Championship in the poll era, and 18th all-time.

The Crimson Tide traveled to Hard Rock Stadium in Miami, Florida, where 14,926 socially distanced fans watched Heisman Trophy winner Devonta **Smith** have 12 receptions for 215 yards and three touchdowns. The most successful College Football program in history rolled to a 52-24 win against The Ohio State University Buckeyes. Alabama guarterback, and Heisman Trophy Finalist, Mac Jones completed 36 of 45 passes for 464 yards and five touchdowns. This beat out last year's Heisman Trophy, and National Championship Winning quarterback, Joe Burrow of LSU (Louisiana State University). "I think the stats speak for themselves, [and] Alabama had an offensive line that allowed Mac Iones to put up big numbers," Michael **Tadlock**, an avid 'Bama fan claimed.

The National Championship is the culmination of the entire season. Alabama's success would not have been possible without quarterback Mac Jones, running back Najee Harris, and wide receiver Devonta Smith, who became known as "The Big 3." This win is a continuation of a long dynasty under Nick Saban.

This dynasty has been strong through many players and assistant coaching changes over the years. Though **Mac Jones** has declared for the 2021 NFL Draft, **Bryce Young** is scheduled to take over as a sophomore next season. Even a major change at quarterback should not slow down the Crimson Tide next season.

"I believe they will be [dominant] in the next few years because of the huge talent of the recruits they are bringing in [...]," acknowledged MSA Senior, Taylor Mallady when asked if he thought Alabama would continue their dominance in the coming years. One thing that has always been consistent about Alabama since the hiring of Head Coach Nick Saban in 2007 has been depth. In fact, because the Tide are so deep there have been key players lower on the depth chart that have transferred out in recent years. Even though some key players transferred, it has not killed the overall success rate of the team, as will be seen with the transition from Mac Jones to **Bryce Young.**

When Nick Saban put the iconic scripted letter "A" of Alabama over his heart for the first time, he already had one national championship ring from his time at LSU. The Alabama program was barely staying above water. Their history proud of winning championships had almost been forgotten since they last won it all in 1992. At the time many Tide fans were still holding onto the 25 years of glory from 1958-1982 with former Alabama player Paul "Bear" Bryant as Head Coach.

During that time they won six national championships and 13 conference championships. Since the **Nick Saban** era began, 'Bama has won both championships seven times each.

Though some key pieces will be missing next year, there is still a lot to look forward to in 2021. Bryce Young will be returning as a sophomore with current freshman running back **Jase McClellan** and sophomore tight end **Jahleel Billingsley**. Though the future remains bright for Alabama, there is one thing that also continues to remain: the expectation to keep the Dynasty alive.
